### Unencrypted Networks

Encryption is the process in which messages are sent between a computer and a wireless router in the form of a "secret code". These messages become unreadable unless the code is deciphered with the right key. Most routers are shipped from the factory with encryption turned off by default, and it must be turned on when the network is set up.

If an IT professional sets up the network, then chances are good that encryption has been enabled. However, there is no surefire way to tell if this has happened.

Internet providers now just need a signature from President Trump before they're free to take, share, and even sell your web browsing history without your permission.

The House of Representatives passed a resolution today overturning [an Obama-era FCC rule](#) that required internet providers to get customers' permission before sharing their browsing history with other companies. The rules also required internet providers to protect that data from hackers and inform customers of any breaches.

The resolution was [first passed by the Senate last week](#) and now heads to the president, who's expected to sign it. At that point, there'll only be a vague baseline of privacy rules governing internet providers and some promises from them not to misbehave.

It's hard to see this as anything but a major loss for consumers. While reversing the

**A LOCK ICON** next to a **Wi-Fi** network name indicates it is an encrypted, secure connection. You will need to enter a password to connect to this kind of network. Once connected, **ALL** traffic between your phone and the internet is encrypted and protected from eavesdropping, interference or tampering.

**If a Wi-Fi network does not** have a lock icon next to its name, it is running in unencrypted, unsecured mode. Traffic sent across that connection **MAY** be susceptible to eavesdropping, interference or tampering. You may still be required to enter a username and password on a login screen, for example, at a hotel, but that does not mean the **Wi-Fi** connection itself is encrypted.

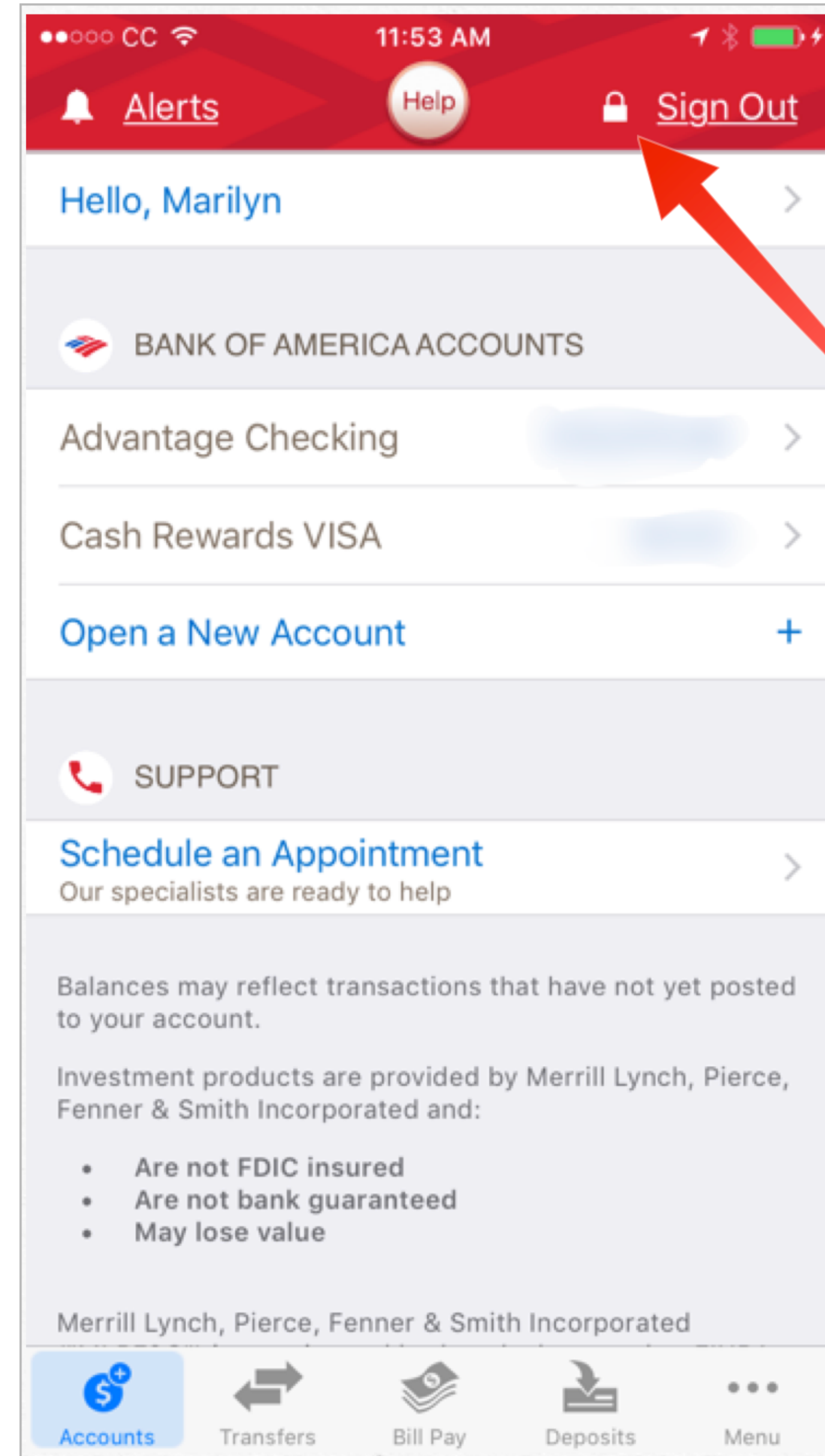


In Safari, a **LOCK ICON** in the address bar indicates that the site you are visiting is encrypting **ALL** traffic between your device and their site, **REGARDLESS** of whether you are using an encrypted Wi-Fi connection.

Almost **ALL** large, reputable sites now encrypt **ALL** traffic by default, so you can be sure that what you are seeing on your device is what they meant for you to see. Encrypting the traffic between your device and their servers insures that your session with that site is protected from eavesdropping, interference or tampering.

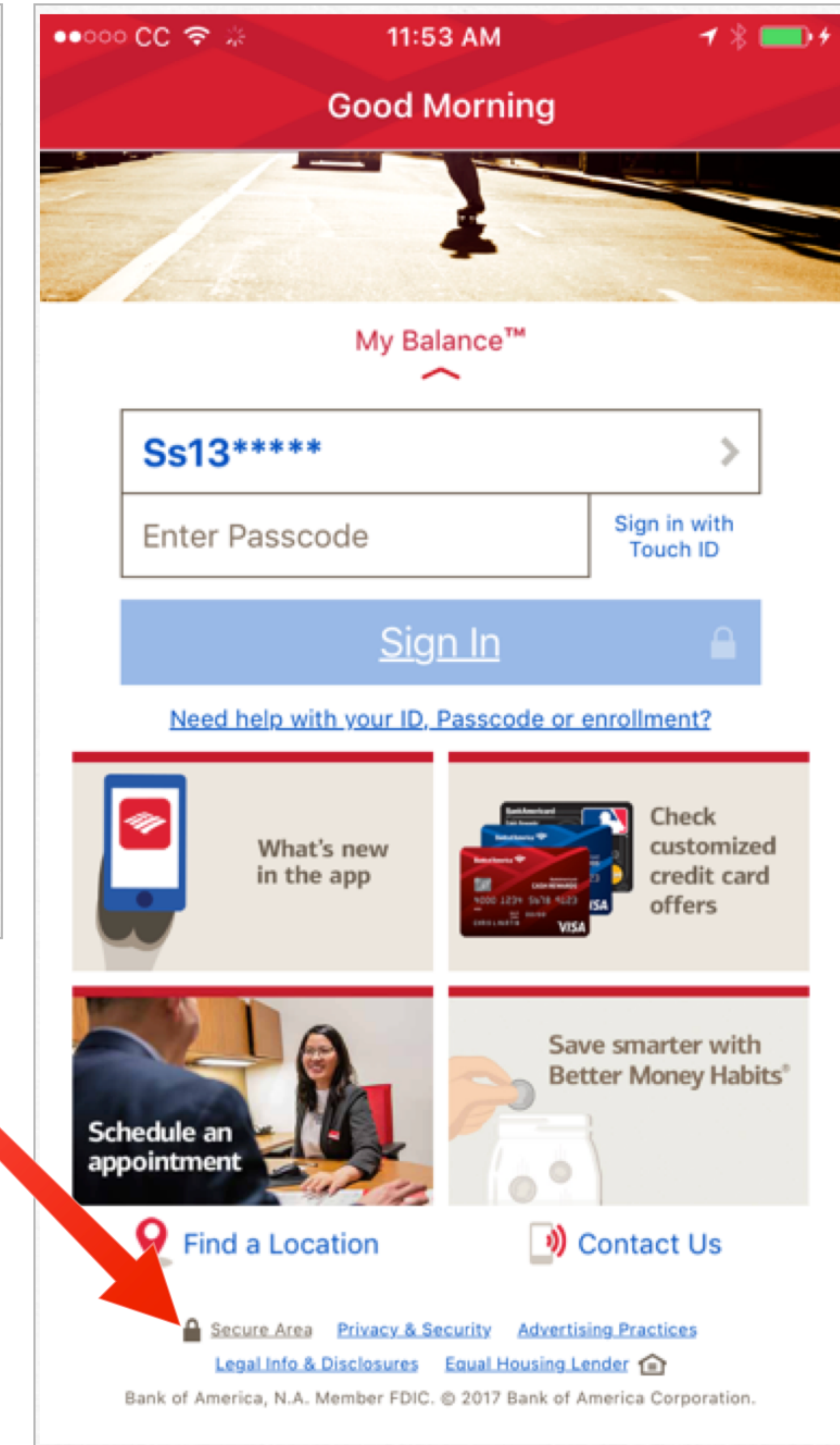
**ALL iOS apps that involve finance, health, ecommerce, shipping, money transfer, insurance and many more are REQUIRED by Apple to encrypt ALL traffic between their app and their servers.**

**WASHINGTON** — The chairman of the Federal Communications Commission on Wednesday outlined a sweeping plan to loosen the government's oversight of high-speed internet providers, a rebuke of a landmark policy approved two years ago to ensure that all online content is treated the same by the companies that deliver broadband service to Americans.

The chairman, Ajit Pai, said high-speed internet service should no longer be treated like a public utility with strict rules, as it is now. Instead, he said, the industry should largely be left to police itself.
